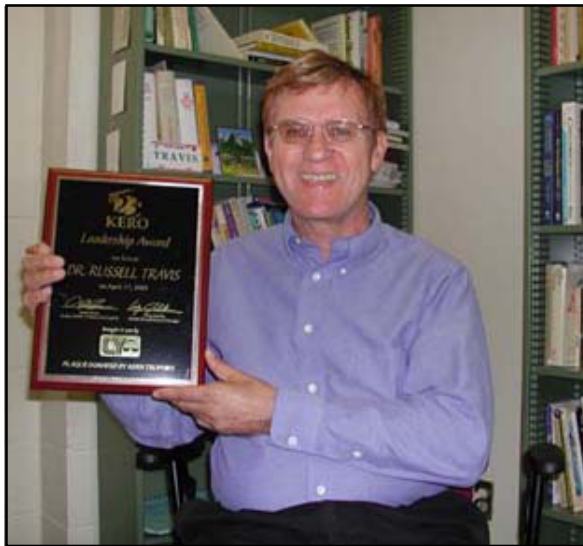

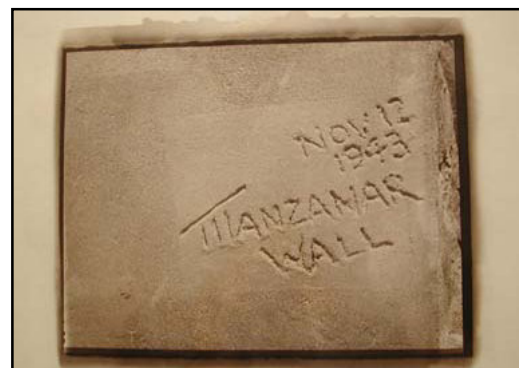

On Tuesday, April 15, the Department of Art and the Kegley Institute of Ethics co-sponsored *Images of Manzanar: The Japanese American Internment, 1942-1945*. The event started at the Todd Madigan Gallery with a reception and opening exhibition of *Images of Manzanar*, featuring images by Art Professor **Michael Heivly**. A seminar followed which included presentations by Sue Kunitomi Embry, internee at the Manzanar Relocation Center, Founding Chairperson of the Manzanar Committee, and Editor of *The Manzanar*; Arthur Hansen, Founding Director of the Japanese/American Oral History Project, Professor of History at CSU Fullerton, and Senior Historian at the Japanese/American National Museum in Los Angeles; and Frank Hays, Superintendent of the Manzanar National Historic Site. **Dr. Edwin Sasaki**, Associate Vice President for Academic Affairs and Dean of Undergraduate Studies at CSUB, and internee at the Tule Lake Relocation Center served as moderator.
